Sponsor a Pig was created to defray the cost of raising "medical-grade" pigs at the Diabetes Research and Wellness Foundation Islet Resource Facility. Pigs at our facility are maintained in a special sanitary environment in order to make their islet cells suitable for transplantation in people with diabetes. Our pigs are cared for by highly trained caretakers, they eat special food, drink purified water, and breathe filtered air. It costs \$50 per day to maintain a pig in this type of environment.

Pigs may be sponsored for a day, week, month, quarter, or year. We encourage you to sponsor a pig for yourself or a loved one as a way to celebrate a memorable happening such as a birthday, marriage or promotion. You may also want to sponsor a pig as a way to honor a special person in your life.

Elaine Sue

why a cure is so desperately needed

An adorable toddler with curly hair and big blue eyes, Elaine Sue was only two when her mom noticed problems. She had an insatiable thirst and was soaking her diapers faster than her mom could change them. She also slept much of the time and seemed lethargic when awake.

A visit to the family's pediatrician confirmed that Elaine had type I diabetes. Elaine had joined the ranks of more than 2 million other Americans who suffer from this debilitating form of diabetes. She would now be dependent on insulin injections, and her mom would be responsible for giving Elaine the painful injections, monitoring her blood glucose levels and working to balance her food intake.

In addition to her pediatrician, Elaine would see an endocrinologist for specialized diabetes care, an ophthalmologist for eye examinations, and a podiatrist for foot care. Her mom would see a dietitian and diabetes educator to learn the skills needed for daily diabetes management. Elaine's parents were conscientious and concerned. They spared no expense to see that their daughter received the best care available. They were assured the disease was manageable and that a cure would be found soon. But Elaine's diabetes was not easily controlled and she died at nine years of age in a diabetic coma after having a bout with the flu.

Spring Point Project is working in partnership with the Diabetes Institute for Immunology and Transplantation at the University of Minnesota to find a cure for diabetes and make tragic stories like Elaine Sue's a thing of the past. Because many people with diabetes lack sufficient insulin-producing islet cells, the cure we have in development involves producing safe, reliable islets that can be transplanted to reverse the effects of diabetes. It is our hope that we will soon have a cure for insulin-dependent diabetics that will be widely available and affordable.

our facility

The Diabetes Research and Wellness Foundation Islet Resource Facility, home of Spring Point Project, became a reality in January 2007 when our staffing was completed. In February, the name—Diabetes Research and Wellness Foundation Islet Resource Facility—became official and we proceeded to hold a very successful grand opening. We were impressed by the large number of supporters who showed up in below zero weather to help us celebrate this important event—including the large delegation from the Diabetes Research and Wellness Foundation (DRWF).

A number of us made visits to Washington to build awareness for Spring Point Project among senators and representatives on the Hill and in August, Congressman Ron Kind from east Wisconsin visited our facility.

We also welcomed delegates from the DRWF United Kingdom and DRWF France to the DRWF Islet Resource Facility in September. The DRWF provided the grant that covered the construction of the Islet Resource Facility and continues to be a major supporter of Spring Point Project.

Pig Postings

We have accomplished a lot this past year.

- We opened in February.

- Our older animals have entered the in-house breeding program.
- We expect our first piglets in the next generation, the Source Animal Generation, to be born in April 2008.

Just one week after our grand opening, the first sows arrived to deliver their piglets. By the end of 2007, we had completed the population with almost 60 animals at the DRWF. The first boars and gilts have now started the breeding process, and we expect the first animals in the next generation to arrive in three to four months. Thus, we are on track to meeting our breeding milestones!

our newest member

In June, Mack Traynor joined our family to oversee our finances. He has given a major boost to our fundraising campaign. Great work, Mack.

scientific recognition

In September, the Joint Transplantation Congress was held in Minneapolis. Under the championship of Dr. Bernhard Hering, Spring Point was able to hold a reception at the event. A number of scientific experts in the field made short announcements endorsing our work and many of our supporters were able to talk directly with experts in islet and xeno-transplantation. This important event allowed Spring Point Project to receive the full attention of the scientific community for the first time.

an award

Tom Cartier, SPP president, was awarded one of KARE 11's Eleven Who Care Awards in September. Each year, KARE 11 honors 11 individuals who inspire change in their community. Over 1,000 people attended the event and thousands more watched the ceremony's live telecast

2008 starts great

We now have a Master Research Collaborative Agreement with our major partner, the Diabetes Institute for Immunology and Transplantation (DIIT) at the University of Minnesota. This agreement describes all the details of the partnership between the University and Spring Point Project.

In addition, the immunosuppression studies being conducted by Dr. Bernhard Hering and his colleagues have made major progress, with a productive and positive review from the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation last month.

Finally, together with our colleagues at DIIT, we reinforced islet cell isolation studies focusing on the target age of 6-9 month-old donors.

We thank everyone for supporting our work in 2007. We ask for your continued support and look forward to celebrating many victories with you in 2008.

Lions and Pigs Together ... Oh my!

Founded in 1917, the Lions Club is an international network of 1.3 million men and women in 202 countries. Each year, local Lions Clubs work on a wide variety of short-term and long-range projects designed to improve the lives of people in their own communities, as well as those around the world.

One long-range project the Lions are particularly well-known for is their effort to end preventable blindness. Because diabetes is a leading cause of blindness in the United States, the Lions of Minnesota 5M-10 district in Duluth took notice of Spring Point Project and started working with us right from our inception.

On January 26 and 27, Henk-Jan Schuurman, CEO, updated the 5M-10 district Lions in Thunder Bay, Ontario on Spring Point's partnership with the Diabetes Institute for Immunology and Transplantation (DIIT) at the University of Minnesota. After the presentation, Larry Winner, diabetes co-chair for district 5M-10 and consummate Spring Point supporter, presented Henk with a stack of checks from the 5M-10 district totaling \$14,000 in donations for Spring Point.
